HIGHLIGHTS OF BCA ANNUAL MEETING SEPT. 21, 2004

An interesting and varied program was presented at the September annual meeting, including information about urban wildfires and urban deer and coyotes. A sample of information given by the various speakers is listed below.

Randy Farrar - Wildlife Biologist, Texas Cooperative Extension Service- Wildlife Services Dept.

[When Mr. Farrar spoke to us, there was no active coyote management program in effect in Austin. However, during the past two months, this situation has been rectified. Travis County has contracted with the Wildlife Services Dept. of the Texas Cooperative Extension Service to provide a coyote management program in our area.]

- Coyotes are very territorial in nature, with each family needing its own space, and each male/female combination returning to its own space. A coyote will attack a dog to protect its space. Each female coyote has 5-6 pups per year, born in March-June. The parent coyotes are very aggressive this time of year in protecting the pups.
- Coyotes are not normally shot or trapped in urban areas. Consequently, urban coyotes do not perceive humans as threats.
- <u>To prevent attacks on dogs and cats</u>: 1. Don't provide any food for coyotes. 2. Throw a rock or stick at a coyote to harass it. (Cayenne pepper spray also works.) 3. Keep cats inside, especially at night. 4. Fenced yards help protect dogs. However, coyotes can climb chain length fences, like dogs.

- Some coyotes have rabies. Coyotes are also <u>very smart</u>. If you see menacing behavior by a coyote in your area, call 311 to report it.
- City regulations prevent a person from discharging a firearm within the city. Bows and arrows are also prohibited. If a coyote is trying to attack you or your dog, you should call 911 for immediate help. Just remember, though, that police officers will be reluctant to shoot a coyote within the city limits because of the tremendous amount of paperwork involved in reporting the discharge of a police firearm.

Update, MESA-GREYSTONE UTILITY PROJECT

Staff members of the City of Austin Public Works Dept held a meeting Jan. 12 at Doss Elementary School to update residents of the Northwest Hills area on the progress of the Mesa/Greystone transmission mains project. Recall that the goal of this project is to improve water capacity to over 1,000 NW area residents by installation of additional water transmission lines along Mesa and Greystone Drives in the area between Spicewood Springs Rd. and Far West Blvd. Existing water lines will also be cleaned after the new lines are operational.

The day before Thanksgiving, after approximately 80% of the project had been completed, an unexpected thing happened: the here-to-fore reputable contractor ceased to answer phone calls from City staff, and abandoned the construction site. Shortly afterward, Public Works was informed that the contractor had filed for bankruptcy.

Current Status; Work to be Completed

The bonding company for the City has taken over responsibility for the remainder of the project. This company has hired a consultant to re-bid the project to completion. Prospective contractors are being interviewed. A new contractor should be in place by late February. Barricades will be back up after the new contractor has been chosen. New pipe is in the ground from Grevstone to Far West, and has been pressure tested. About 200 linear feet (LF) of new 24" pipe needs to be laid and pressure tested on Mesa Dr. and wet connec-tions need to be made at Far West Blvd., Deepwoods Dr., Cat Hollow, Honeycomb Rock and Greystone Dr. (A wet connection is when the contractor turns off the water in the old line, drains

the line, and connects the new pipe to the old one.)

Additionally, a 48" pressure tap at Spicewood Springs & Mesa will be done, as well as a pressure tap at Far West & Mesa. (Pressure tap is when they drill into an existing line to make a connection.) Bacteriological testing of the new line will be done after pressure testing is completed. Bacteriological testing will be done on the [isolated] new line and must be done several times to assure that the new line is free from bacteria. Each test takes almost one week to complete. During these tests, it will appear that no work is going on at the project site. The old 20" water transmission line running along the east side of Mesa Dr. will be isolated and cleaned after the new 24" line is operational. Paving of the affected streets will be the last item completed. Traffic on Mesa Dr. will be affected again from Spicewood Springs Rd. north approx. 200 feet. Two-way traffic will be maintained, but there will be lane closures, especially during paving.

Everett Thomas—Austin Fire Department

With regard to potential urban wildfires, our western Austin canyons are hot spots. We are number three in the U.S. for the potential of having an urban forest fire, just behind southern California and parts of Colorado. People living in or near forested canyons need to clear out the ground cover, dead branches, and dead trees from around their houses. We also need to prune overhanging trees from our houses. Our neighbors need to do the same. What we need around our houses is "defensible space." The Austin Police Dept. cannot, and will not, put its firefighters and equipment in danger by trying to fight a fire in and around a house that they feel is not "defensible."

The Austin Fire Dept. has distributed a bulletin entitled "Living in the Urban-Wildland Interface," which describes "defensible space" and gives a formula for determining what that space should be for a structure of a specific height. Defensible space needs to increase if a home is built on a hill, because fire travels more rapidly uphill than on flat land. Firefighter Thomas recommends that we read the bulletin carefully and apply the suggestions given therein so that our urban homes in beautiful forested terrain can be saved in case of wildfire.
